4.	Matters ArisingThe Panel asked if the information contained in the tables in item 6 from the previous meeting be included for comparison. The papers for this meeting have been prepared with this request in mind.All other matters will be covered during the course of the meeting.

	An interest was noted for David Bream in a named beneficiary. This was noted by the Chair.	
6.	Business Support Programmes Status Update Report	
	The LEP Executive confirmed IOW Natural Enterprise figures have changed slightly to take into account recent funding stream amendments from IOW Rural Fund. The LEP Executive are satisfied with these changes.	
	A panel member reiterated that we need to be comfortable that the 'number of jobs safeguarded' output from beneficiaries is robust. Particular attention was drawn to the disparity between the number of jobs reported across the various funds. The LEP Executive confirmed the process itself is robust, but the LEP Executive does rely on applicants confirming these numbers.	
	The LEP Executive confirmed the LEP will investigate these numbers more closely and will report back to the BSIP accordingly. The LEP Executive also confirmed the Solent LEP will consider the evidence provided to support safeguarded jobs numbers in any future funding.

However, it was recognised that this needs much more attention and it was requested that the BSIP members present ideas to the LEP Board in the near future.

Title:	Business Support Programmes Status Update

Purpose:	To provide the Business Support Investment Panel with an update on Solent LEP SME grant programmes

Introduction

This report provides panel members with an update in relation to progress and changes to LEP Business Support programmes since the 4 April 2022 meeting. It includes high-level information on job outcomes and awards made.

SME Priority Sectors Loan Fund

At the Solent Summit held at the new Horizon Cruise Terminal at Southampton on 8 June 2022 the Solent LEP launched two new loan funds. The first, Solent LEP Prosperity Loan Fund, which invited applications for loan funding between £100,000 and £1,000,000 and the second, Solent LEP SME Priority Sectors Loan Fund, which invited applications for loan funding between £15,000 and £99,000. The level of loan funding available was 50% and 80% respectively of total project costs.

In terms of the SME fund applicants had a deadline of 8 July 2022 to submit the Expression of Interest (EOI) form as the first part of the application process. The LEP received six EOIs requesting loan funding totalling £280,000 with the total cost of the projects being £438,000.

An initial eligibility check was completed on the submitted EOIs and two applicants were invited to submit a full application by 30 September 2022.

Ahead of the application deadline one of the applicants invited to apply discussed their application with a member of the Accountable Body's Finance team. Following this conversation, the applicant confirmed they were unable to provide appropriate security for the loan and would not be proceeding to application stage.

The deadline passed and no applications were received for the Solent LEP SME Priority Sectors Loan Fund.

The LEP received seven EOIs for the Solent LEP Prosperity Loan Fund. After the initial eligibility check was completed five applicants were invited to submit a full application. The LEP received three applications, and these are being considered by the Funding, Finance and Performance Management Group at their meeting on 8 November.

As a result of this initial round, the LEP Executive together with the Accountable Body are reviewing the prospectus of both loan funds. It is the intention to undertake a further round for both loan funds in the new year. This will be discussed further at the Funding, Finance and Performance Management Group (FFPMG) meeting on 8 November.

BSIP is asked to <u>advise</u> the LEP Executive on possible amendments to the loan funds in order to make them more attractive to SMEs.



Current Fund Status

The status of the funds and job outputs, as at 19 October 2022, can be viewed in Tables 1 and 2, below. Any changes since the last meeting have been shown, and the paper from the 4 April meeting is also available in the meeting pack for comparison.

- Green & Sustainable Business Hub


The chart below graphically illustrates the levels of support provided by the Solent LEP Growth Hub to the local business community since September 2021.



The Type of Support chart below categorises activities into three main areas of growth, stabilise/maintain and start up. This chart illustrates the majority of activity this financial year has been in the area of business growth.





The Growth Hub Key Support Requests chart below gives a more detailed breakdown of the sort of enquiries coming forward to the growth Hub so far this financial year. Finance & funding and coaching & mentoring have seen the highest number of requests to date.

These figures are monitored monthly, and provide the Growth Hub with data that influences their responses to local needs.





It is proposed that for future BSIP meetings, the existing Business Support Dashboard chart is removed and more detailed and illustrative data is presented. This will provide a better insight into Growth Hub activities, and could help to inform future discussions around funding support for SMEs.

Crowdfunder

As reported at the last meeting, Crowdfund Solent has now closed. As the final projects supported continue to be monitored, updated outputs will be shown in the table above along with other legacy funds

IoW Rural SME Fund

As previously reported at the last Isle of Wight Rural SME Fund Local Action Group meeting held on Thursday 13 January 2022 the full allocation of grant money to the IoW Rural Fund was committed. Please see comments below regarding the re-allocation of some funding from the New Forest SME Rural Fund to a beneficiary which has allowed their project to be fully funded.

New Forest Rural SME Fund

Due to an applicant, who had received support from the New Forest Grant Approval Panel, withdrawing their application prior to the execution of the contract the grant amount requested for that project, £24,924, remained to be allocated. Following discussions between Natural Enterprise and New Forest District Council a decision was taken that, given the deadline for defrayal of funds, that there was insufficient time for a new application round to be opened. Subsequently, £10,000 of this figure was allocated to the IoW SME Rural Fund to enable a beneficiary to be fully funded for their project. Due to the full allocation of funding for the IoW Rural Fund this business had been allocated a grant of £5,000 rather than the requested £15,000. The balance of the New Forest Rural SME funds will be returned to the LEP for distribution via future SME funding calls.


